North Yorkshire Police Updates – some news item highlights from the last 12 months

June 19

How are we making our area safer in the future –

You may already be aware but your local Neighbourhood Policing Team constantly strive towards making Northallerton the safest it can be and to give you an insight into this I thought it might be useful to share with you a snap shot of some of the projects we are currently developing and working on –

- i) We are working with Northallerton BID to trial an information sharing App with retailers and pubs which would allow premises to share with other members live and real time suspicious activity, photos and cctv of offenders, information and intelligence and also details about events and meetings.
- ii) We are working with retailers who sell vouchers in the town to contact us if a customer purchases large amounts of gift cards which is a sign the customer may have been a victim of fraud. Fraudsters contact vulnerable people and deceive them into sending the voucher codes over email and facebook which are then sold on.
- iii) We currently working with multiple agencies and schools to look at getting early intervention for vulnerable primary school students who are assessed as being likely to be involved in crime and anti-social behaviour in the future hoping with support and advice we can steer them away from this helping them make the right life choices.
- iv) We continue to develop the Northallerton Youth Space which goes from strength to strength.

v) We continue to meet with our local Children's Homes to discuss their residents and look to support the schemes with early intervention and advice.

vi) Our work with the Street Angels continues as this project thrives and has now become a permanent fixture with the support and care that is offered in our night time economy and we have had requests from other areas asking how we set our scheme up and what processes are required to replicate it. A real sign of success for this flag ship project.

This is just a few of many projects that are currently being progressed by your local team in partnership with the towns other agencies, all driven by the information and intelligence we receive from our community.

July 19

Northallerton Youth Space continues to succeed

As Northallerton Youth Space approaches its first birthday there is no doubting the success the scheme has achieved, bringing a safe and positive environment to the young people of our town. Further proof of this, if we needed it, is that we have seen a reduction in anti-social behaviour on Friday evenings of 49% since January this year. Great work by all involved and well done to our young people who have responded to the scheme in such a positive way.

October 19

Great results

Over the last couple of months we have had some excellent results which I would like to share with you –

The male responsible for the £441,640 Bradleys Jewellery Robbery on 11th March 2019, 38 year old Victor Okumu from Middlesbrough, was found guilty at court on 12th July and was sentenced to 10 years and 6 months imprisonment. The judge commented that this had taken a very dangerous man off our streets.

Following a number of vehicles being attacked in Brompton a male was arrested near to the scene and has subsequently been charged with theft from motor vehicle and vehicle interference.

A drugs warrant was executed at an address in Bullamoor Close, Northallerton resulting in a male being arrested on suspicion of drugs offences. This male has been released under investigation whilst enquiries continue.

Poachers warned as police step up rural crime operation

The seasonal trend of illegal hare coursing matches the farming calendar, meaning there is typically an increase in poaching offences in September and October, after crops have been harvested, and fields are left empty and open.

North Yorkshire Police have joined Operation Galileo, a major clampdown on poaching offences. Galileo is a national campaign, pioneered by Lincolnshire Police, and bringing together forces particularly affected

by this offending. Forces will work together to ensure the issue is tackled in a co-ordinated way, by sharing information and working across force boundaries.

As part of the operation in North Yorkshire, vehicles previously linked to poaching will be identified and targeted. Suspects will be stopped and dealt with robustly, and victims will be visited to obtain witness statements. Police intelligence and the Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) network will be used to ensure an effective response to suspicious vehicles and activity.

Days of action will be planned using officers and specialist resources from the Rural Taskforce, Proactive Policing teams, Neighbourhood Policing officers and Mobile Rural Watch volunteers. During these days, police will deploy to areas of high activity, to prevent offending and investigate offences.

February 20

Partnership approach in Hambleton to tackle fly tipping

North Yorkshire Police is working in partnership with Hambleton District Council's "Street Scene" to target the ruination of the local countryside by fly tipping.

Inspector Sarah Sanderson, of Hambleton Neighbourhood Policing team, said: "Under Operation Clean, North Yorkshire Police and Hambleton District Council combined can target the problem together rather than just the council.



"The police have the technology and systems to help identify the offenders so that the council can seek a prosecution. This is a sharper joined-up approach and can achieve so much more than silo working. The sharing of information is crucial to bringing offenders to justice.



"The type of fly tipping would suggest serious organised crime groups are involved, so any information that the public can give is crucial.
